# WHO WE ARE



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## **CLUB OVERVIEW**

Since 1967, HHBGC has been providing a safe place for children to learn and grow. Founded on the site of historic Sportsman's Park, former home to the St. Louis Browns and Cardinals baseball teams, the Club is a source of hope and opportunity, serving more than 8,000 youth annually of which 3,500 are registered members. Nationally recognized programs help youth succeed in school, stay healthy, pursue interests in arts and sports, and explore career choices. Membership fees are kept low to allow any child the opportunity to join. An annual membership costs only \$25 and that includes free vision and dental care!

# **2009 CLUB HIGHLIGHTS**

### 2009 was a great year for Herbert Hoover Boys & Girls Club!

We were pleased to recognize the **Taylor Family Foundation** and personally honor **Mr. Jack Taylor** for a generous gift of \$1 million to endow our Character & Leadership Development programs. These programs will now be known as the **Taylor Character & Leadership Development Programs**.

2009 marked the first full year of the **Deaconess Impact Partnership**, the Club's capacity building program generously funded by a four-year grant from the **Deaconess Foundation**. The capacity building program, aligned with the Club's strategic plan, seeks to improve and expand the Club's infrastructure, enabling us to offer more services to more kids in the future.

As part of Major League Baseball's All-Star Game weekend in St. Louis, we unveiled our new All-Star Field (seen on page 7), made possible through a generous donation from MLB, Cardinals Care and the Anheuser-Busch Foundation. Several Club members got to participate in the weekend's All-Star Game, Home Run Derby, Fanfest, and other activities. Boys & Girls Clubs of America is MLB's charity of choice and we are very grateful for all they do to help our kids!

Mentor St. Louis (MSL) joined the Club! In the Fall, Mentor St. Louis became a program of the Herbert Hoover Boys & Girls Club. MSL has been the region's largest school-based mentoring program and the largest group of volunteers in the St. Louis Public Schools in recent years. The new affiliation means MSL will continue its focus on improving literacy under the banner of HHBGC. Members and mentees will continue to have the kind of support which helps make this program special for all of its participants.

All Hail the Commander-in-Chief! On July 31<sup>st</sup> the United States Postal Services delivered a large brown envelope addressed to the members of Herbert Hoover Boys & Girls Club – Adams Park Unit. The return address was 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue, Washington DC, "The White House!" Club Members had sent congratulatory letters to the Commander-in-Chief and the Obama family. 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### OUR UNIT HIGHLIGHTS (CONTINUED) Adams Park Unit

The Adams Park Unit began operating in 2007 in South City at the Adams Park Community Center. This unit currently serves 900 children with more than 100 attending daily. Located in the Forest Park Southeast neighborhood, the 28,000 square-foot center offers organized sports, fitness and recreation activities as well as teen and education programs. The facility includes a gym, dance studio, fitness center, game room, computer lab, Clarkson Eyecare Vision Clinic and the Jim Edmonds baseball field.

- In Summer 2009, members participated in a Club-wide art project entitled Box City. Directed by Alan Kmetz, this project was designed to teach participants about building a city and what it takes to make a community. The city was constructed out of cardboard boxes. Guest speakers Craig Schmidt, a local City Alderman, and Gregg Daly, the Collector of Revenue for the City of St. Louis, were present for the unveiling.
- Rent-A-Center (RAC) generously donated electronic games, TVs and furniture to improve the overall environment of the teen center. On August 27th, a press conference was held to thank RAC for their contribution. A silver plaque now hangs in the space recognizing it as the RAC Room.

### Southeast Middle School Unit

The Club's first school-based site, the Southeast Middle School Unit, which is located in the Spanish Lake community, opened in 2008. This unit operates five days a week and serves 180 children with more than 50 attending daily. It is a partnership with the Hazelwood School District and St. Louis County. Club members have access to a gymnasium, performance stage, library, technology center, cafeteria, art room and game room.

- Youth learned the benefits of eating healthy, nutritious foods while participating in Operation Frontline's "Power of Eating Right", a six-week cooking and nutrition course provided by Operation Food Search. Members acquired cutlery skills, food safety tips and proper cooking techniques. At the end of each session, members feasted on the fruits of their labor and were supplied with a bag of groceries to replicate the meal for their families.
- Extreme Art 2009 classes, funded by the William S. Anheuser Charitable Fund, a fund of the Greater Saint Louis Community Foundation, were provided twice a week during a seven-week summer enrichment camp. Projects included recycled art, jewelry making, African masks, 'paint my jeans', mosaics, collages and graffiti art.



# **ALL-STAR WEEK 2009**

What a week! Major League Baseball put on a grand celebration July 10-14 in St. Louis for the MLB All-Star Game. Throughout the five-day event, Club members were provided with fantastic opportunities, VIP treatment and a lifetime of memories.

As part of the All-Star Game celebration, Herbert Hoover Boys & Girls Club was treated to a new baseball field, courtesy of Major League Baseball and Cardinals Care. The new field will provide the Club's RBI and Red Bird Rookies programs with a place to practice, play games and host tournaments.

Following the field dedication, 100 volunteers from Rawlings provided the Club with a "green" mural (designed by Club Alum, Keith Westbrook), memorial garden and also renovated the multi-purpose room. These projects were made possible through the generous support of The Frank Foundation.

Thanks to Tickets for Kids Charities, Club members and their families were provided with free tickets to attend MLB FanFest, where they tested their baseball skills, met current and former players and saw baseball history come to life.

### **Presidential Honor**

The most remarkable opportunity took place just minutes before the All-Star game when Joshua Jones, HHBGC Youth of the Year, had the distinct honor of meeting President Obama, who threw out the ceremonial first pitch. Joshua, proudly representing his millions of Boys & Girls Club peers, shared a personal moment of thanks and appreciation with the President. He had his photo taken and was given a commemorative Presidential coin as a keepsake.

### All-Star Game Day

The day of the big game was a special one for Club members Percy Brown and Amanda Watts. They were featured on Good Morning America with Dancing with the Stars alum, Melissa Rycroft. Amanda and Percy spent the day with Melissa at FanFest and then headed to the stadium to meet some of the All-Stars including Derek Jeter and Albert Pujols before the game.

Moreover, nearly \$750,000 in donations were raised to support the Boys & Girls Club mission. Boys & Girls Clubs of America remains grateful for its partnership with Major League Baseball, which continues to provide once-in-a-lifetime opportunities for Club members, their families and Club staff.




# MESSAGE FROM ALUMNUS Marvin Crumer
